





Raised by Animals: If you were raised by animals, which ones would you want to be raised by? Dolphins? Wolves? Horses? Or something else? Why would you want to be raised by this kind of animal?





Hard and Soft C (read to your child, then explore the words on the list with the letter manipulative of your choice):

- The letter "c" can make two sounds.
- It can sound like /k/ as in "cake," and we call this a hard C.
- It can also sound like /s/ as in "face" and we call this a soft C.
- Usually, "c" makes the /s/ sound when it is followed by "e", "i", or "y."
- Usually, "c" makes the /k/ sound when it is followed by "a", "o", "u", "l", or "r."

There are many more examples of the soft "c" sound, but most are found in words with two or more syllables (which we will cover in future weeks.) If your child is already starting to read two-syllable words, you may introduce the following examples:

Prompt (read first): When we end a sentence, we must use punctuation to show that the thought is complete. Last week, we used periods to end our sentences.
